My Application

Use the following questions this week to reflect on what it would mean to align yourself with the truths taught in Scripture. Each question is meant for both personal reflection and as a catalyst for discussion with your family, friends, or small group.

- 1. What is your peg? What is the ultimate motivation for all the activities in your life? Be as honest as you can.
- 2. How can God command us to love Him and our neighbor? Does this work? Where does our power to love come from? See 1 John 4:7-11; Romans 5:6-8.
- 3. In what way is the greatest commandment great? See Romans 13:9-10, Galations 5:13-14 and James 2:8-11. Why is loving our neighbor essential to all other commands? See 1 Corinthians 13:1-3.
- 4. If loving our neighbor is priority one to Jesus, why do so many (50%) Christians in America not know their neighbors' names? How would our community be different if every Christian took the Great Commandment seriously?
